Introducing Union Fenosa Wind Australia

In the middle of 2008, two companies joined forces to form a new powerhouse in the development of renewable energy in Australia. Those companies, TME Australia Group and Union Fenosa, combined to create Union Fenosa Wind Australia (UFWA).

You may be aware that TME Australia has been undertaking the preliminary stages of a wind farm development in Berrybank for some time.

The core team from TME Australia is still with UFWA but is further enhanced with the backing and expertise from the Spanish energy group, Union Fenosa.

Union Fenosa has earned a reputation as a growing international energy supplier with a specialty in wind energy.

Worldwide, Union Fenosa has a capacity of over 11,500 MW of installed electricity. That's equivalent to the generation capacity of Victoria and Tasmania combined, and it is still growing.

By combining TME and Union Fenosa, the Berrybank project will benefit from local knowledge and experience combined with the vast expertise and financial backing of one of Europe's big energy utilities.

Project Update

Late in 2007, TME formally submitted the preliminary details of its proposed Berrybank wind farm to the Minister for Planning, Justin Madden. This information was provided so the Minister could assess the need for an Environmental Effects Statement (EES). Minister Madden concluded that an EES was not necessary, as any potential environmental effects of the project can be adequately assessed through the normal planning permit process.

Upon finalising the partnership between Union Fenosa and TME, UFWA has now resumed work on the development. Working with local landowners, Councils and relevant government departments UFWA is now preparing a planning application.

A team of expert consultants, each leaders in their field, is working with local stakeholders to develop the planning application.

This team, together with UFWA, will be at the information day on Saturday 22 November between 2 and 6pm. They'll be there to answer any questions you may have on the project or the company.



Key stats of the proposed Berrybank wind farm

Number of Turbines: 100


Electricity generation capacity: Approx 200-300 MW

Number of homes supplied: Approx 146,000 = to Canberra and Ballarat.

Cost: approximately \$484 Million, Approx 25 percent of which will be spent locally

Jobs: Approx 240 full time jobs during construction and 15 for maintenance and operation for the life of the project.

Environmental Benefits: Displaces 1 million tonnes of carbon a year or equivalent to taking 230,000 cars off the road
